Today in History

March 20th

In 1413 England's King Henry IV dies and is succeeded by Henry V.

In 1616 Sir Walter Raleigh is released from the Tower of London.

In 1727 Physicist, mathematician and astronomer Sir Isaac Newton dies in London.

In 1760 The "Great Fire of Boston" destroys 349 buildings.

In 1815 Napoleon Bonaparte enters Paris, beginning his "Hundred Days" rule.

In 1816 The U.S. Supreme Court, in its *Martin vs. Hunter's Lessee* ruling, affirms its right to review state court decisions.

In 1852 Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin," is published.

In 1885 John Matzeliger patents the shoe lacing machine.

In 1922 The first aircraft carrier, the USS Langley, is commissioned.

In 1934 Rudolf Kuhnold demonstrates a primitive form of radar.

In 1956 Union workers end an 156-day-old strike against Westinghouse.

In 1969 President Richard Nixon says he will end the Vietnam war in 1970.

In 1976 Newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst is convicted of armed robbery for her part in a San Francisco bank holdup.

In 1987 The Food and Drug Administration approves the sale of AZT, a drug shown to prolong the lives of some AIDS patients.

In 1988 An airplane flying over Shoreline Park in Mountain View, CA, catches the kite string of 8-year-old DeAndra Anrig, lifting her 10 feet in the air and carrying her 100 feet before she let go.

In 1989 Baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth confirms that his office was investigating Cincinnati Reds Manager Pete Rose.

In 1997 The British government said that a rare brain disease that had killed 10 people was probably linked to so-called "mad cow disease."

In 2001 In a Navy court, the skipper of the USS Greeneville accepts sole responsibility for the February 9 collision of his submarine with a Japanese trawler off Hawaii that killed nine Japanese.

In 2004 The U.S. military charges six soldiers with abusing inmates at Abu Ghraib prison in Iraq.

March 21st

In 1621 The Pilgrims and Indians make a treaty.

In 1790 Thomas Jefferson reports to President George Washington in New York as the new secretary of state.

In 1918 During World War I, Germany launched the Somme Offensive, hoping to break through the Allied line before American reinforcements could arrive.

In 1932 Tornados kill 232 people in Alabama.

In 1945 During World War II, Allied bombers begin four days of raids over Germany.

In 1952 Tornados kill 208 in Arkansas, Missouri and Tennessee.

In 1965 More than 3000 civil rights demonstrators led by the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. begin their march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama.

In 1972 The U.S. Supreme Court rules that states may not require one-year residency in order to vote.

In 1986 The presidential commission investigating the Challenger disaster viewed footage of the space shuttle's fatal launch the previous January; the film revealed a flame from a booster rocket leak triggered the explosion.

In 1992 President George Bush and German Chancellor Helmut Kohl meet at Camp David, Maryland.

In 2001 The space shuttle Discovery touches down, bringing home the first residents of the international space station.

March 22nd

In 1630 The first colonial legislation prohibiting gambling is enacted in Boston.

In 1638 Religious dissident Anne Hutchinson is expelled from the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

In 1733 Joseph Priestly, dubbed the father of soda pop, invents carbonated water.

In 1765 Britain enacts the Stamp Act to raise money from the American colonies. The Act sets off such a strong protest, it is repealed the following year.

In 1794 Congress passes a law prohibiting American vessels from supplying slaves to other countries.

In 1857 The first department store elevator, invented by Elisha Graves Otis, is installed in New York.

In 1946 First U.S. Rocket to leave earth's atmosphere (50 miles) is launched.

In 1954 The first shopping mall opens in Southfield, Michigan.

In 1960 Al Schawlow and C.H. Townes obtain a patent for the laser.

In 1968 President Johnson's daughter, Lynda, is ordered off Cable Car because she was eating an ice cream cone.

In 1972 Congress sends the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the states for ratification. (It fell short of the two-thirds approval needed.)

In 1981 First Class Postage rises from 15 cents to 18 cents.

In 1982 Third Space Shuttle Mission; Columbia 3 is launched.

In 1990 A jury in Anchorage, Alaska, finds former tanker captain Joseph Hazelwood innocent of three major charges in connection with the massive "Exxon Valdez" oil spill, and convicts him of a minor charge of negligent discharge of oil.

In 1990 President George Bush declares "I do not like broccoli and I haven't liked it since I was a little kid."

In 1993 The launch of the space shuttle Columbia is scrubbed with three seconds left in the countdown.

In 1994 "Woody Woodpecker" creator Walter Lantz dies at age 93.

In 1996 The shuttle Atlantis blasts off carrying astronaut Shannon Lucid to a rendezvous with the Russian space station "Mir."

In 1997 Tara Lipinski, at age 14 years and 10 months, becomes the youngest women's world figure skating champion.

March 23rd.

In 1775 In a speech to the Virginia Provincial Convention, Patrick Henry makes his famous plea for American independence from Britain when he says, "Give me liberty or give me death!"

In 1806 Having reached the Pacific Coast, explorers Lewis and Clark begin their journey back east.

In 1840 The first photo of the moon is taken.

In 1914 A tornado kills 94 in Omaha, Nebraska.

In 1918 During World War I, Germany initiates the use of a terrifying new weapon, a 25-foot cannon nicknamed "Big Bertha."

In 1919 Benito Mussolini establishes his Fascist movement in Milan, Italy.

In 1929 The first telephone is installed in the White House.

In 1933 The German Reichstag adopts the Enabling Act, which effectively granted Adolf Hitler dictatorial powers.

In 1976 35 nations ratify the International Bill of Rights.

In 1980 An oil spill is capped after 3 billion barrels leaked into the Gulf Of Mexico from a offshore well

In 1988 President Reagan announces he will visit the Soviet Union for the first time the following May for his fourth summit with Gorbachev.

In 1989 Astronomers say an asteroid as big as a mountain passed within 500,000 miles of Earth. It was classified as a near miss.

In 1990 Former "Exxon Valdez" captain Joseph Hazelwood is sentenced by a judge in Anchorage, Alaska, to help clean up Prince William Sound and pay \$50,000 in restitution for his role in the 1989 oil spill.

In 1992 The U.N. Security Council announces that Libya had offered to surrender two men suspected in the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 to the Arab League. (Libya changes its mind 2 days later.)

In 1994 Wayne Gretzky breaks Gordie Howe's National Hockey League career record with his 802nd goal.

In 1997 The American Cancer Society recommends annual mammograms after age forty.ers.

In 1998 "Titanic" ties a record by winning 11 Oscars, including Best Picture, Best Director and Best Song.

In 1999 NATO Secretary-General Javier Solana authorizes airstrikes against Serbian targets following the failure of Kosovo peace talks.

In 2002 Irina Slutskaya captures her first world title, defeating four-time champion Michelle Kwan at the World Figure Skating Championships.

In 2011 Actress Elizabeth Taylor dies at age 79.

March 24th

In 1765 Britain enacts the Quartering Act, requiring American colonists to provide housing for British soldiers.

In 1883 Long-distance telephone service is enacted between Chicago and New York City.

In 1932 WABC/New York broadcasts a variety program from a moving train.

In 1934 President Franklin D. Roosevelt signs a bill granting future independence to the Philippines.

In 1955 The first sea-going oil drilling rig is placed in service.

In 1955 The Tennessee Williams play "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" opens on Broadway.

In 1964 The U.S. mint issues the Kennedy half-dollar coin.

In 1981 "Nightline" with Ted Koppel premieres on ABC-TV.

In 1989 The nation's worst oil spill occurs when the Exxon tanker Valdez runs aground on a reef in Alaska's Prince William Sound and began leaking 11 million gallons of crude.

In 1992 The space shuttle Atlantis blasts off with seven astronauts on the first shuttle mission devoted to the environment.

In 1993 A cab driver believed to have organized the World Trade Center bombing is flown back to the United States from Egypt.

In 1996 NASA astronaut Shannon Lucid transfers from the space shuttle Atlantis to the Russian space station Mir, beginning a 5-month stay.

In 1997 Vice President Gore arrives in China for the highest-level U.S. visit in eight years.

In 1998 A former FBI agent says papers found in James Earl Ray's car support a conspiracy theory in the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s death.

In 1998 Two students, ages 13 and 11, open fire outside their school in Jonesboro, AR, killing four classmates and a teacher.

In 2001 A Twin Otter plane crashes into a mountainside house on the In 2001 U.S. skater Michelle Kwan wins her 4th World Figure Skating,

March 25th

In 752 Pope Stephen II dies, only 2 days after his election.

In 1634 Maryland is founded by English colonists sent by the second Lord Baltimore.

In 1755 George Washington plants pecan trees given to him by Thomas Jefferson.

In 1776 The Continental Congress authorizes a medal for George Washington.

In 1807 British Parliament abolishes slave trade.

In 1813 The first U.S. flag is flown in battle on the Pacific on the frigate Essex.
In 1857 Frederick Laggenheim takes the first photograph of a solar eclipse.
In 1863 The first Army Medal of Honor is awarded.
In 1865 During the Civil War, Confederate forces capture Fort Steadman in Virginia.
In 1954 RCA begins manufacturing the first color television sets. (The sets, with 12 1/2-inch picture tubes, were expected to cost \$1,000 each.)
In 1994 American troops complete their withdrawal from Somalia.
In 1997 Former President George Bush, 73, parachutes from a plane over the Arizona desert.
In 2013 Golfer Tiger Woods returns to the world number one ranking.

March 26th

In 1804 The Louisiana Purchase is divided into the Territory of Orleans and the District of Louisiana.
In 1845 A patent is awarded for adhesive medicated plaster, the pre-cursor of the bandaid.
In 1872 Thomas J. Martin is awarded a patent for the fire extinguisher.
In 1885 Eastman Film Company manufactures the first motion picture film.
In 1892 Poet Walt Whitman dies in Camden, New Jersey.
In 1950 South Dakota's then 24-hour snowfall record is set at 38 inches.
In 1953 Dr. Jonas Salk announces a new vaccine against polio.
In 1958 The U.S. Army launches America's third successful satellite, Explorer III.
In 1989 Soviet voters participate in the first free election since 1917.
In 1989 The sci-fi adventure series "Quantum Leap" debuts on NBC-TV.
In 1990 Designer Halston dies in San Francisco at age 57.
In 1997 39 members of Heaven's Gate techno-religious cult are found dead after a mass suicide.
In 1999 The computer virus "Melissa" infects computers across the country.
In 2000 Vladimir Putin is elected Russia's second democratically chosen president.
In 2012 Canadian Filmmaker, James Cameron, becomes the first person to visit the Challenger Deep, the deepest point on Earth in over 50 years.
